We also supported AMDA programs by funding Phase 3 of the "Drive 2 Deprescribe" program and supporting a Community Platform for members to connect and share best practices. While supporting these worthy endeavors, we have further developed our capability to establish donor-endowed funds that allow donors to gift in a manner that will preserve their gift in perpetuity while supporting the Foundation annually from their generous philanthropic investment.

2023 RESEARCH & CLINICAL RESOURCES GRANTS

The Foundation for Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Medicine focuses its fundraising and grantmaking activities on advancing vital strategic priorities in supporting excellence and innovation in service to the practitioners working in the post-acute and long-term care medical field.

In 2023, the Foundation supported the below with funding support totaling \$90,500. In 2024, the Foundation has committed \$100,000 in support of funding awards focused on research and clinical projects in the advancement of excellence to accepted grants.

"Post-Acute Care Utilization Patterns and Outcomes for Frail Older Adults" lead investigator, Dr. Charles Semelka

\$25,000 AWARDED

Dr. Charles Semelka of Wake Forest University School of Medicine and his team of researchers will investigate the impact of frailty on post-acute care outcomes for older adults following hospital discharge. The study will assess whether there is an optimal setting for post-acute care services for frail older adults and how the degree of frailty affects anticipated outcomes. By analyzing data from one US-based healthcare system, the project seeks to understand the differences in hospital discharge location and health-related outcomes among older adults with and without frailty, while controlling for

demographic and other common geriatric conditions. The study will also include a survey of SNF healthcare providers to gain insights into their experiences and suggestions for improving the care for patients with frailty.

"Certified Medical Directors in Nursing Homes: An Evaluation of the Current Landscape, their Association with Quality, and Early Impacts of California Law AB749" by Drs. Brian McGarry and David Grabowski

\$50,000 AWARDED

Dr. Brian McGarry of the University of Rochester and Dr. David Grabowski of Harvard Medical School were awarded Foundation funding to examine the effects of this new law and to more broadly study the impact of certified medical directors on the quality of care provided to patients and residents. Thus far, the project has leveraged several datasets, including CMS nursing home staffing data and American Board of Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Medicine (ABPLM) data on certified medical directors (CMD), to create a multi-year dataset that characterizes medical director involvement for nearly all of the roughly 15,000 nursing homes in the U.S. Ongoing analyses are examining the relationship between medical director presence, including the presence of a CMD, and the quality of care provided to residents. Results of these analyses are expected in the summer of 2024 and they will provide an important baseline for later evaluations of AB 749 when this law becomes binding for most California medical directors.

"Drive 2 Deprescribe" Phase 3

\$7,000 AWARDE

The PALTC setting has one of the highest polypharmacy rates, which increases the risk of adverse events and drug interactions. The optimization of medications benefits patients and their families by reducing their risk for adverse events and drug interactions, thus improving their quality of life and reducing financial costs. The care force working in PALTC benefits by reducing the overall medication burden, reducing the risk of patient falls and cognitive impairment, and improving global health outcomes such as hospitalization and death.

On May 20, 2021, AMDA, with support from the Foundation, launched the initiative: Drive to Deprescribe – Optimizing Medication Use in PALTC (D2D). Participation is free, with over 1,500 registrants.

There are 3 phases to this initiative: Phase 1 (2021-2022): Monthly calls, each focused on optimizing medication use of a different class of medication. Phase 2 (2023): Quarterly calls, quarterly podcasts, and the development of an Optimizing Medication Use in PALTC course (first 3 modules). Phase 3 (2024) Quarterly calls, and development of additional modules (3-4) for the Optimizing Medication Use in PALTC Settings course.

In 2024, with financial funding from the Foundation, the D2D team plans to produce: 3-4 new modules for our Optimizing Medication Use in PALTC course (each focused on optimizing medication use of a different medication class) and quarterly D2D podcasts.



Community Platform for AMDA Membership



\$8,500 AWARDED

AMDA members have long expressed the need for a vehicle to network outside of conferences with colleagues in sharing best practices, and opportunities for collaboration while building deeper relationships as a benefit to their AMDA membership. AMDA is launching a new website and with funding from the Foundation will host a Community Platform replacing the Members Only Forum that will allow members to connect via a directory, join special interest groups, search for forum posts, connect with committee members, and an array of other opportunities to connect and collaborate.

Workforce Development: The Futures Program

In 2023, 87 candidates attended AMDA's Futures Program, the largest class in this effort's history. In 2024, the Foundation has committed to funding \$100,000 to this program furthering the Foundation's continued commitment to inspiring practitioners to join the field of post-acute and long-term care medicine.

The PALTC Foundation has provided more than \$1.4 million dollars to the Futures Program over the last two decades sponsoring more than 1,400 healthcare professionals to explore and encourage leadership positions within the post-acute and long-term care space.



Excellence Awards Program

As part of our mission, the Foundation recognizes the outstanding contributions of our members to post-acute and long-term care medicine with the following annual excellence awards: These awards provide a very visual and lasting legacy to the professional pursuits and accomplishments of our giants in the field and set the example of exemplary practice for others to aspire to.

William Dodd Founder's Award for Distinguished Service Arif Nazir, MD, CMD

The William Dodd Founder's Award for Distinguished Service recognizes significant contributions to building the Society's organizational strength, image, and mission by promoting the development of competent, compassionate, and committed medical practitioners.

It is named for AMDA Founder William Dodd, MD, CMD.

The 2023 William Dodd Founders Award for Distinguished Service was awarded to Arif Nazir, MD, CMD. As shared in his nomination, "Arif has held every significant position in AMDA over the years. His presidency energized...the average, frontline AMDA member in a positive way. His push for increased technology utilization in PALTC was the first movement for the increased utilization of information technology for frontline clinicians. He has put AMDA and its clinicians in a positive spotlight. He has pushed care initiatives to his and other chains of facilities in quality initiatives and the use of intradisciplinary team members. To know him is to sense his impetus for positive change in PALTC."



Medical Director of the Year Award Rani Rao, MD, FMCP, CMD

The Medical Director of the Year Excellence Award recognizes those individuals whose vision, passion, leadership, knowledge, and commitment succeed in taking patient care to exceptional levels of quality, excellence, and innovation.

The 2023 Medical Director of the Year was awarded to Dr. Rani Rao, MD, FMCP, CMD. Dr. Rao's nominator said: "When Dr. Rao arrived at Coler on March 30, 2020, NYC was the epicenter of the COVID-19 Pandemic in our country, and all of her efforts became focused on dealing with this public health crisis of an unprecedented nature. From day one, she rounded with our frontline workforce on the nursing units, conducting group meetings to help calm their fears and apprehension while doing all that she could do to get them sufficient supplies and PPE, and to obtain emergency replacement staff for our health care workers who became ill from COVID-19. Throughout the pandemic months, she worked diligently with other key leaders at Coler to maintain close lines of communication between residents and their families, arranging interdisciplinary meetings via videoconference to discuss plans of care."



James Pattee Award for Excellence in Education

The James Pattee Award for Excellence in Education recognizes significant contributions to enhance AMDA's educational structure and framework to advance education specific to PALTC practice and promote AMDA leadership through educational endeavors within the LTC continuum. It was established to honor James Pattee, MD, CMD, the father of the AMDA Certification Program and the Core Curriculum program.

The 2023 James Pattee Award for Excellence was jointly awarded to Sheryl Zimmerman, PhD and Philip Sloane, MD, MPH. Their nominator explained, "Drs. Sloane and Zimmerman have performed the editor's role for JAMDA in an exemplary fashion. Always a voice for PALTC and AMDA, JAMDA has fulfilled that role incredibly well with their leadership. The journal has been elevated to a higher position in the academic world and made JAMDA the preeminent publication for PALTC. Worldwide articles have been solicited, edited, then accepted and published. Editorial articles have defined PALTC, outlining where it has been and where it should be headed. Many of those editorial articles have been penned by Drs. Sloane and Zimmerman, with the balance crafted by PALTC thought leaders. Drs. Sloane and Zimmerman are the exemplars of Jim Pattee's vision for PALTC education and dissemination through AMDA."



2023 Clinician of the Year Award Vikas Reddy, MD

The Clinician of the Year Award recognizes members of the interdisciplinary (IDT) team who serve in PALTC settings. It honors a licensed healthcare practitioner who is directly involved in treating and caring for people in PALTC settings and embodies excellence in patient/resident care.

The 2023 Clinician of the Year was awarded to Dr. Vikas Reddy, MD. Dr. Reddy's nominator noted that "Dr. Reddy is recognized as a strong advocate for our patients and residents and demonstrates compassion and thoughtfulness in his interactions with them and their families. His collaborative approach with other team members has established him as a role model amongst his peers and associates. Involvement in community medical services is important to him and he is constantly developing new projects to bring clinical insight and guidance to the vulnerable populations we serve."


